

Forgiveness

Then Peter came and said to him, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant

"For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand

talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.'

And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt.

Stir in us a willingness to speak and act beyond the safety of study groups for the sake of your good creation.

Hear our prayers, O God, for the faithfulness of the church. For the church, too, is caretaker of the land we hold – even as we are called to be harbingers of the land and realm you promise.

May our practices of, and relationships with the land, as individuals and congregations, be in keeping with the values of your commonwealth.

Hear our prayer, O God, for eyes and spirits open to your presence – especially in the places where we may feel you distant or removed, even in the places where we might try to flee from you. Even in those shadowed lands, you accompany us upon the way.

You bring healing. You wait upon us. You love us with a love that will not let us go.
